Easter Greetings

Easter is the certain promise of new birth.





Hope even in the face of death. Now as much as fond memories can try and bridge the gap, death tears us apart from those we love. The anguish of death is something we all share. Easter holds out for us the hope that death won't be the final word. Jesus, ready to share in the depths of our darkness, even to his own death on the Cross, has defeated death and held out for us the certain hope of the resurrection. Life is the final word.

Easter brings us hope too in the face of evil and suffering. On the Cross we see a man in agony. It is not a pretty sight. It never has been and never will be. And yet we confess it is a beautiful sight, because on the Cross we see a manifestation of love enduring through and therefore transforming suffering. Out of love Jesus was ready to face rejection. Even as people taunted and teased him, he stretched his arms out on the Cross to embrace the whole world. That embrace was for everyone; even those wishing his death. What appeared to be a terrible and despairing end on the Cross therefore became for all of humanity a sign of hope. He was ready to suffer out of love and so his suffering was not futile. He won for us a share in God's life and grace. Our suffering too, through his Cross, can therefore become a source of life and grace for those around us.

And finally, Easter brings new birth where sin has shackled us. In small ways and perhaps great, we have all at times made decisions that have hurt ourselves or others. We have all at times chosen what is selfish over what is good; what we want over what God wants for us. In other words, we have all sinned. In small ways and great, we have sinned. Now we know from experience that when we hurt someone a block appears in our relationship that needs to be cleared, a wound that cries out for healing. We also know that even after we have recognised our fault, shame or fear often holds us back from seeking that healing. How can I face my loved one again? Will they, can they, forgive me?

Christ's arms stretched on the Cross teach us that shame and fear of rejection have no place in our relationship with God. The Father sent his Son out of love for the world. The Cross is the guarantee of that love. But more than that, it is also the sign of our healing and forgiveness. Just as the Cross defeated death; so too did it defeat sin. Just as life has the victory over death, so grace and mercy has the victory over sin. Perhaps there is a block in our relationship with God, perhaps a wound that cries out for healing. In this year of mercy, let us be encouraged by Pope Francis to seek God's forgiveness and healing in the sacrament of confession and to encounter there the warm embrace of the Father's love for us.

Wishing all our Mount St. Bernard College community a happy and holy Easter and our students and staff a restful and relaxing term holiday. See you all back in Herberton at the start of term two.

Dear Parents and Friends of MSB

I wish all families and friends of MSB a safe and relaxing holiday period with their children. It has been a long term with much success and growth for our students. I want to stress the importance of supporting all children to remain safe over the holiday period. As many of our students have access to technology and social media, please ensure you are talking to your child about eSafety.

Talk to your child about cyberbullying before it happens. Together you can work out strategies to address any potential issues and reassure them you will be there to support them. If your child is experiencing cyberbullying:

Listen, think, stay calm — talk to them about what happened, try to remain open and non-judgemental, ask them how they feel and ensure they feel heard.

Collect evidence — it is a good idea to collect evidence, such as screenshots, of the bullying behaviour, in case you need to report it later on.

Block and manage contact with others — advise your child not to respond to bullying messages and help your child block or unfriend the person sending the messages.

Report to site or service — many social media services, games, apps and websites allow you to report abusive content and request that it is removed.

Report to eSafety — if serious cyberbullying is affecting your child and you need help to get the material removed from a social media service or other platform you can make a cyberbullying report to us.

Get help and support — check in with your child regularly about how they are feeling. If you notice any changes that concern you, get help through a counselling or online support service.

My Artist Statement by Sherrika Gilbert

My artwork is based on an Indigenous Australian pop singer called, Jessica Mauboy. She is my favourite singer since I was a small child. Therefore as my role model it seemed fitting to choose such an inspirational woman as my Archibald Prize Portrait.

The concept was 'sense of self', through this I developed Ideas about who Jessica Mauboy is as a person, her identity and how I personally relate to her. I am an Aboriginal girl from Kowanyama and my favourite colour is pink. These are two things that we have in common. This painting is entitled 'Jessi' which is short for Jessica.

After trial & error I decided to use the third design out of my visual diary to mark-up onto my canvas. I spray painted my background pink and painted Jessica's face and hair with acrylic paint. Painting the face required a lot of time and thought. I needed to consider every element of design in my painting techniques to capture Jessica's energy. My colour palette of skin tones varied each day as I built up my layers. My final stage was to make the look three dimensional by adding shadows to her face and hair.



Year 11 Biology




We experimented with algae balls to see how different factors affected the products produced by the algae cells. We found that when the algae balls had sunlight they used photosynthesis to create energy but when they couldn't access sunlight they used cellular respiration.





Students have created models of the cell membrane and the cell organelles to demonstrate their understanding of cells and how they transport materials across the membrane.





Timothy cut a fantastic cross section from a red onion. To put under the microscope.

Through this section we were able to identify the cell walls and how different types of salty solutions changed the shape of the cells.



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We have started our new unit and have been looking at how oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged in the body. The Year 11's made this fantastic model where they labelled key structures and identified key characteristics which enable gas exchange to occur quickly throughout the body.

CSIRO Indigenous STEM Awards

The CSIRO Indigenous STEM Awards recognise, reward and celebrate the achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and scientists who are studying and working in the science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) field, as well as the integral role schools, teachers and mentors have in supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in pursuing STEM education and careers. The awards also recognise the immense value of connecting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students with inspirational STEM role models, both Indigenous and non-Indigenous.

Part of these awards was the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Student Maths Award. This award recognises students who have shown a passion, engagement and improvement in mathematics as well as demonstrating how they have used mathematics to solve a real-life problem.

The winners of this award in 2019 were Renee and Stacey Edwards.

The students were presented with a medallion by Ms Georgina Brewer from the Tableland Regional Council, certificates by Dr Sally Towns from the Catholic Education Office and cheques for \$625 by Mr Torres Webb from the CSIRO.
