Principal's Report



"Do all you can to assist and love one another". Mary MacKillop 28.1.1890

Mount St Bernard College is continuing to look to grow and develop as a secondary college. So far this year the College sought a variety of forms of feedback to inform both short and longer term strategic goals for improvement. There have been three key data collections this year:

- **1. Boarding Australia (now Indigenous Education & Boarding Australia) boarding review** Boarding Australia uses a framework aligned to the National Boarding Standard to review boarding schools and facilities. This included reviewing:
 - Practical design for new building and renovation projects including student accommodation;
 - Recruitment and workforce issues;
 - Mentoring and professional development;
 - Quality improvement and risk assessment;
 - Identification of project partners and community engagement opportunities;
 - Indigenous education;
 - Working with remote and rural students;
 - Responses to State and Federal inquiries.
- **2. Student, Staff and Parent Satisfaction Surveys** the College engaged the professional services of MYP Corporation to undertake school surveys to ascertain feedback on areas such as Catholic ethos, leadership of the college, teaching and learning, student protection and community engagement.
- **3. QELi (Queensland Educational Leadership Institute) Independent Review** QELi Reviews provide quality independent feedback on the effectiveness of school practices and process for school improvement. The review process identifies areas that are strengths of the school and areas for improvements.

Thank you to all parents, students and staff for their feedback in one or more of the above reviews. Results are due in the coming weeks and significant time during the remainder of the year will be dedicated to interpreting results and setting goals.

Last Thursday was the feast of St Mary MacKillop. From an early age, Mary MacKillop, who was born and grew up in Victoria, longed to leave all she loved and live for God alone by serving those in the greatest need. Mary was a woman who raised the powers of love in her time and continues to inspire us to do the same in our day. Love was at the heart of all that Mary did. She recognised that the source of her love had its origin in God.

Recently families, staff and students were asked to take part in the annual "School Satisfaction Survey". Although it is difficult for many of our caregivers to access this, we did receive some great responses. We will be looking at ways to improve caregivers ability to engage with the survey in 2020.

A great deal of very interesting data and opinions came from the survey results. Student Protection was one of the areas that was highlighted as needing some more information and explanation. **So what is Student Protection?**

Catholic Education Services through MSB has a commitment to providing a safe, supportive, inclusive and positive place for students to be educated.

In order to keep the young people in our care safe and assist them if they experience anything that is troubling for them it is mandatory for staff working in school to:

- reduce the likelihood of harm to children,
- create conditions that increase the likelihood of identifying and reporting harm, and
- respond appropriately to disclosures, allegations or suspicions of harm.

In between - Pencil Drawing

'In-Between' is a continuation from a previous concept called 'The Faces'. I wanted to create an intricate portrait conveying themes of the abstractness of the soul and the time in-between life and death. The concept and focus for the artwork came from mentor artist Henriette Harris. Her distorted portraits influenced me to create an artwork inspired by hers. I chose to use 2B and 4B pencil on textured paper so that smaller details could be featured. My artwork portrays a younger girl centered in the middle of the page with a distorted face. The distortion connects both parts of the face, matching up so that the tone is the same in both. This represents the soul along with the eyes (symbolizing the phrase 'the eyes are the window to the soul'- they don't have much detail so it shows how the soul is leaving). the viewer may not be able to directly infer this meaning from a quick glance at the drawing, however the use of line, lack of colour and tone help to convey the overall sombre mood.



Broken Connection

My artwork is entitled 'Broken Connection' and is my response to an artwork sent to me by Receive/Respond. I wanted to communicate a story about my family history. My Great-Grandmother's younger sister was taken away and was part of the stolen generation. Unfortunately, that side of the family have lost their connection to Kaytete culture.

I communicated this disconnection from family through the hand prints. One hand print is painted in Kaytetye style painting and the other is empty. The wavy blue line through the middle is broken by lines and dots.

The white represents pwitarenke or mal-male (sorry business); this is when we get painted up after we lose a family member. The red is significant in our ceremonies especially for apwelhe (men's business). I think it is a tragedy that all my Great-Grandmother's descendants have lost their Kaytetye identity. They are disconnected from our beautiful culture.

'Nangala' Tanisha Vincent Year 11 My artwork is entitled Nangala, it is my mother's Kaytetye skin name and also her middle name The reason I chose to paint my mother is that she is one of the most strong and inspiring Aboriginal people that I know. I made three semicircles on the sides of the painting inside each one are; bush bananas, bush tomatoes and bush beans which are found in my local area. Beside my mother I painted a digging stick which in my culture symbolises women. For my mother's face and clothes, I used oil paint to give it texture.



RESPOND Ella Keowski Why Do You Care? **Acrylic Paint**

In a modern society where your social status masks the truth of your evolving life story, the number of likes and reaction gained on a post, determines how interesting and important your story is. "Why do you care?" resembles the questions of the younger generations manipulated by social media and shows representation of the mind, clouded by the immaturity of what online audiences want to see, and not what actually makes an individual interesting. The artwork in response to the received work relates in a storytelling way that connects the message of how our life stories are told within older and younger generations, in contrast between the storytelling through social media and stories passed on through generations.
