- 5. Student engagement data

Our priority areas for 2020 are:

PRIORITY AREA 1: Mercy Charism

Goal: Increased effect size in NAPLAN writing (Year 7-9) to 0.6

(Well above Australian Average Effect Size of 0.46)

- 1. Explicit Teaching of 'High Impact Teaching Strategies' for Writing in all learning areas
- 2. Termly administration, collation and analysis of Unaided writing assessment
- 3. Teacher professional learning in formative assessment, marking and moderation for writing
- 4. Introduction of Pat Hipwell's Graphic Organisers for scaffolding writing (All learning areas)
- 5. Tracking of writing gain in Informative text types

The leadership Team is also working hard to produce a 3 year Strategic Plan that provides direction for improvement over a longer time frame. We have established 3 'Rocks';

- 1. Clear, consistent, evidence based, intentional practice.
- 2. Mercy charism underpins culture and practice.
- 3. A focus on sustainability is at the core of visioning and decision making.

The Leadership Team and Staff will spend the remainder of the Term breaking these three 'rocks' down into several sub sections. I will continue to provide updates on this important work through future newsletters.



Ash Wednesday

In the last newsletter, we mentioned how we were about to observe *Shrove Tuesday* or "Pancake Tuesday" — the day before Lent begins and traditionally when we use up all the yummy stuff in our cupboards before starting our fasting. Well, having devoured lots of pancakes and rich toppings the day before, by Wednesday 26th March MSB was ready to kick-off Lent. We began with the whole College in the Chapel — the spiritual heart of our Mercy community—for a penitential liturgy with distribution of ashes. Project Compassion

A regular part of our Ash Wednesday liturgy each year is the launch of our annual Project Compassion initiative. While *Caritas* supports a very wide range of deserving causes, this year's feature stories include among others:

- Red Dust Healing—an Australian ministry helping people escape various destructive addictions.
- Agricultural training and support in various countries where just a little scientific insights and basic technologies have enabled families and villages to escape the cycle of poverty due to crop failure.
- Centre of Hope in PNG—training and support to reduce and eliminate domestic violence.

Project Compassion is our College's major annual fundraiser for responding to poverty, oppression and disadvantage around the world, including in Australia. Please support our efforts in whatever way you can.

Inspired by Catherine McAuley to respond to human needs around her, a number of our students have already facilitated some creative fundraising ideas to kick-start our efforts. A student-run disco was well-supported and collected around \$600, while other students organised and ran the pancake sales on Shrove Tuesday and still others again have planned frozies sales and a sausage sizzle for the Cross Country. Careers and Vocational Pathways

Careers

Career Interest Explorer – a quiz to help identify your career interests in vocational areas

Your interests are important in career exploration and decision making, as the information can help you identify your potential career pathways. Career interests are activities you enjoy doing or are interested in. Australian Apprenticeships Pathways have a Career Interest Explorer quiz which can help you identify your career interests in vocational fields. The quiz allows you to answer work type related questions and requires you to indicate your interest in activities relating to the following:* Persuading and Service, * Nature and Recreation, * Helping and Advising, * Creative and Artistic, * Analytic and Scientific, * Practical and Manual and * Organising and Clerical

Your results will be a list of the work types in order of your interests. The work types you are most interested in will be at the top. From here you can search the related jobs and industries and come up with a list of possible jobs you can explore further through reading about them, talking to people already in the jobs and doing work experience.

ATAR

Across Australia, the ATAR is a standard measure of a student's overall academic achievement in relation to that of other students. It is intended to assist tertiary institutions to select applicants into their courses.

The ATAR is a percentile rank, not a mark. This rank indicates a student's position relative to other students in their age group in any given year.

It's expressed as a number on a 2000-point scale from 99.95 down to 0.00 in steps of 0.05.

An ATAR of 80.00 does not mean a student got 80%. It indicates that the student placed in the top 20% of students in Queensland in their Year 12 age group.
