

A great treasure...

In this Sunday's Gospel, we hear Jesus sharing one his sayings about the kingdom of heaven: "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field which someone has found; he hides it again, goes off happy, sells everything he owns and buys the field." (Matthew 13:44-46)

This Gospel story has a lot to teach us about life and faith and I'll get to that shortly; however, it reminds me of a somewhat funny story in the history of MSB...

Up at what we now call the "Top Oval" —where Cross Country and other events are held these days—back some time ago, word got back to the Mother Superior at MSB that miners in the pubs of Herberton were talking about a supposed tin stream running through the college property up where we now call the "Top Oval" (and the new mountain bike tracks). There was a very real threat that miners would be on the property soon staking out their claims! This would mean that MSB would lose that land to the miners. No sooner had Mother Superior heard this than she ordered the Nuns to go up to the top there and stake out claims as widely as they could across the college land. I have heard this story now from a couple of people, including one of the Sisters of Mercy; and I must say that it gave me a bit of a chuckle imaging the Nuns, all dressed in their habits, rushing up the back of the MSB property (in those days it would have been scrub) and staking out mining claims all over the place just to keep it out of the hands of the miners in town.

> But this funny story does connect with the Gospel for this Sunday in many ways. When we truly value something, we'd do everything we can to keep it, get it, or pass it onto our children. For those Nuns back then, it wasn't just about keeping the land; it was also about their Mercy mission. They saw MSB and its Mercy spirituality as like the treasure found by the person in that Gospel story: they valued it so much that they moved heaven and earth to secure it so they could pass on that treasure to later generations of students and staff like us today. We can be grateful to them for this treasure of MSB.

Friends, as we move into Catholic Education Week (3rd week of Term 3 each year) we won't be able to carry-out the celebrations we normally would. But thinking about what makes MSB a valuable treasure, we will invite students from next week to come up with creative ways of promoting *Random Acts of Kindness*. Homeroom teachers will report on what students are doing to share random acts of kindness around the college and from these, the most creative ideas will be recognised with points for their pupil rewards scheme. Ideally, though, we would encourage random acts of kindness every week of the year—something for which MSB is known.



10A English Graphic Novels

































HPE NEWS


