Residential News

Dear Parents and Friends of MSB,

This term has shown an increase in the number of students presenting with signs of depression. Even though our boarding staff are not experts in the field of mental health, we endeavour to triage all concerns that may present. All serious concerns regarding mental health are presented to our College Counsellor Mr Peter Graham. Mr Graham works alongside residential staff to ensure that appropriate support and care is provided. Parents and families are always informed when students are struggling with issues surrounding mental health. Sometimes students will require a care plan or safety plan to support their wellbeing. Supporting students with depression can sometimes be stressful, overwhelming and isolating. Here is some information that may be useful to help you understand what your child is going through.

In Australia, depression is most commonly described as a feeling of sadness. People who are depressed experience an extended period of sadness or a negative mood, rather than a brief reaction of sadness to a stressful situation or difficult situation. In a depressed state, the brain and body do not function as well as they do in non-depressed state. Depression is one of the most common mental health conditions. It is reported that over 3 million people in Australia are reported to be living with depression.

Symptoms of Depression include:

- Sad or irritable mood
- Loss of interest in enjoyable activities
- Unplanned weight loss
- Insomnia or hypersomnia
- Reduced energy and lethargy
- Feelings of guilt or negative self-talk
- Indecisiveness
- Thoughts of death or suicide

What causes depression:

- Stressful and challenging circumstances including disease, loss of a loved one or relationship issues
- Personality and genetic vulnerabilities
- Childhood trauma
- Biochemistry imbalance
- Poor nutrition

How to help a loved one:

The best way to help someone experiencing a mental health challenge or illness is to offer a listening ear and let them know you are there for them. Often, we have a strong desire to fix or solve someone else's problem, however this is not your role and should be left to a professional. The best thing you can do is help them find an appropriate service through a GP, mental health phone line, mental health service or searching online for a nearby agency.



The Launch FNQ Tablelands Innovation

Thanks to the Tableland Regional Council, MSB senior students, **Tanisha Vincent**, **Tahnee Stewart**, **Jilaysha and Jamieka Tilmouth** who participated in the **Launch FNQ Bootcamp** last weekend. This 'entrepreneur-centred incubator and accelerator of tech-startups and scaleups' is a partnership amongst Launch FNQ, local, State, National and Global individuals and groups. Its aim is to help tech-based businesses succeed.



Over the weekend, the girls worked together to develop an idea, refine it to be pitch-ready by Sunday afternoon. Our young entrepreneurs were guided through the challenging process by facilitators, mentors, and business experts.

Part of the program introduced successful entrepreneurs and investors who shared their stories of innovation. This inspiration helped students to learn from the realworld experiences of, for example, Erica Hughes from 'Farmer Meets Foodie' and Mungalli Biodynamic, two local businesses who spoke about their start-up.

Our team decided to explore starting a young artists' collective. The age range was 16-25 years and business model was community- based. Tahnee developed an outstanding user-friendly website with strong visual appeal.

On this hypothetical online platform the girls planned the sale of their products: shirts, cups, tea towels, fabric and similar. The buyers would simply click the design they liked and it would be printed onto their preferred product and sent to the purchaser. The girls asked the panel for \$100,000 for initial materials and start-up costs. They learnt about Intellectual Property and decided to add a further \$30,000 to protect their artwork, website and products.

Team NT (students' business name) came runners-up on Sunday against eight teams.

Despite some anxiety when it came to pitching their ideas to a live audience, the girls developed a sustainable, achievable and innovative idea. The Launch FNQ Bootcamp was highly rewarding. It encouraged students to think about going into business when they leave school and the many possibilities when investing in themselves, their ideas and their futures.

We are currently developing a culinary team within the Year 9 and 10 Year levels that will be able to compete in various culinary challenges in the foreseeable future.
