Principal's Report

This week we acknowledge Reconciliation Week. We know that 'Reconciliation is a journey for all Australians – as individuals, families, communities, organization's and importantly as a nation. At the heart of this journey are relationships between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' (<https://www.reconciliation.org.au/national-reconciliation-week/>).

I am very proud of the fact the Mount St Bernard College is the most diverse but also the most accepting and inclusive communities that I have ever worked in. I believe this is due to a clear focus on strong, positive relationships. At the heart of the relationships at Mount St Bernard College is restorative practices as well as the expectation of all our community to be 'Safe, Respectful & Responsible'.

Restorative practice is a strategy that seeks to repair relationships that have been damaged. Relationships can be damaged through, teasing, 'carry yarn', and other non-inclusive actions. It brings about a sense of remorse and restorative action on the part of the offender and

forgiveness by the victim. So, it is not just about giving out a consequence to the offender, but more about repairing the relationship.

Events like Reconciliation Week and our MSB NAIDOC day are also restorative actions that celebrate diversity but at the same time promote inclusivity.

This weekend we have several students who will share their culture through the 'Unity Through Music' event in Atherton this week.

Dear Parents and Friends of MSB

I am pleased to inform you that term two has seen a great deal of growth and maturity with our boarders. All boarders are abiding by our strict phone regulations and handing in their laptops before bed each night. I wish to thank all families who have supported our efforts to ensure that boarders get uninterrupted sleep each night.

Our focus in boarding for term two has been on tidy rooms and a tidy environment. Many students have improved the level of cleanliness in their rooms, and some are even learning to fold their clothes. Please encourage your student to keep their bedroom tidy and praise them for their efforts. Students who do not complete their chores or maintain a tidy space in boarding are placed on community service or grounded to dorm over the weekend.

This term has seen a focus on sharing culture, in particular song and dance. Many students have taken the opportunity to practice music or dance in the evenings after study. We currently have four dance groups who are preparing to perform at several regional events over the coming months. These students will also perform later in the year at our annual NAIDOC day celebrations. Please encourage your student to participate in these activities which are essential to maintaining their cultural identity and sharing their story with others.

We are just starting to see several senior students suffering from stress and anxiety due to the increasing demands of deadlines and exams. We have numerous quiet spaces at MSB for senior students to set up and work on their studies, they just need to show self-discipline and spend more time on study instead of recreation. Teachers regularly offer their time outside of school hours to support senior students to complete their tasks. All senior students should be taking up this offer.

Finally, please take the time over the coming weeks to make regular contact with your student and praise them for their resilience, respect for staff and commitment to their studies.

Assistant Principal - Well-being Report

This week our Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) topic was about being an UPSTANDER. Students were taught about the difference between being and Upstander or being a Bystander. We want all students at MSB to be part of the solution instead of part of the problem with society. There are many people who want to watch a drama unfold in front of them. It's interesting and people want to know what happens, not really thinking about the people involved in the drama or how it will affect them. At MSB, we want our students to be Upstanders instead of Bystanders when things go wrong. A good Upstander doesn't join in when a student is being bullied. Instead, they choose to support the victim by showing concern and kindness. They reach out to someone struggling and in need of help and support. A good Upstander gets other students to join in and support a victim as well as stand up to the bully. A good Upstander at MSB alerts a trusted adult to assist in difficult situations.

We want students at MSB to know that they have come to a school that is safe and that everyone that goes here knows it is a safe place. Students should know there is no need to be afraid to do the right thing and seek help if a situation is more than they know they can handle. Just standing around and watching doesn't help anyone and doesn't make a school feel safe.

Maths & Science Report

This term has proven to be fruitful in Maths and Science with our Senior Science classes all modifying experiments to explore a topic of their choice. In Biology, one group of students chose to explore the many uses of Algae. With experiments ranging from finding ways to increase the productivity of seaweed as a food source and another student exploring the growth of algae as a source of Omega 3 oil. Each of these experiments had to be written up as an experimental report with justifications of any conclusions the students make. This real world activity is enjoyed by the great majority of our students.

In the junior space our year 9 students have been dissecting pig plucks and eyes and our year 10 students have been investigating motion.

A new initiative for our Maths And Science students is the introduction of the Indigenous Female SSTEMAcademy. This federally funded program tracks young Indigenous females as they progress from school to the workforce and encourages them to stay in the Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics space. We have 4 year 12 students on the program at the moment with 3 or 4 more joining from year 10 in the coming weeks.

Week 4 was Pythagoras and Week 5 was Analysing Data by calculating the mean, median, mode and range. Look at us in full learning *mode* (excuse the pun). All students have experienced success and presented some well-organised bookwork that is perfect for revision.

Year 12 worked independently in small groups to manipulate data sets and construct Stem and Leaf Graphs. It makes me so very proud to see a class so involved with their learning. Tina was our 'Success Monitor' and identified that we achieved everything we intended to do.

Heidi – always being a great supportive peer and assisting others.


Zoe – taking ownership of her learning and making connections to real life.

Year 9 Science Report

Class of 9A does SCIENCE - Body Systems -

Thoracic Cavity Dissection & Heart Rate Investigations



Ms Cazita says a little prayer before each science class in the hope that her students will remember what she taught them, but more so, before the dissection of an animal that has given their body to science in order that children learn.

This term, students of Year 9A were given the task of learning about parts of the **Thoracic cavity**, which houses most notably, the LUNGS, TRACHEA, BRONCHIAL TUBES, AND HEART.

Their teacher had visited hospital days before, and was told that this was quite advanced content for year nine students, and doctors remembered covering the same topic at university.

However, this plucky team of young scientists and doctors projected the dissection onto a screen for better observation, and attempted to inflate the lungs, felt the popping of the alveoli, measured the length of the tongue; then located and drew the important organs, vessels and significant conduits that support breathing and heartbeat.

As part of their course, this term the students have all but mastered a new learning tool called **education perfect** in which the processes of life and living are investigated further.

If you're asking what their homework is, it is to complete the study on Body Systems in Ed Perfect; **Special mention** to Mr Toohey who helped with all things medical and even took on the dissection of the heart valves.

Racing up mountains and raging up stairwells, Year Nine students, as part of their body systems unit, have challenged each other, and themselves, to record their heart rates **at rest** and when **at high speed** which, they seem to be a lot of the time, as any parent will tell you.

A few students took on the role of "doctor".

The Globisens labdisc is extremely useful in monitoring humidity and pressure, amongst other recordings and so, we put the monitor onto our ears or index finger and recorded some very remarkable students, with some very fascinating results.

Immediately after this investigation, we entered the data into excel sheets and began to dissect the facts from the fiction, using Excel's lovely graphing facility.

Next, we will surmise why the differences or lack of ?? between resting heart rate and at speed..

Career Education Report

At this time each year we ask our year 10 students to consider what steps they need to take as they move towards year 12 and the workforce. Many students will say they do not know what they want to do after year 12 so it is often difficult to guide them as they select subjects for year 11 and 12.

Some useful steps which can be taken to assist students to make informed decisions include having them complete:

- ⇒ work questionnaires which identify whether they like being inside or outside and so on
- ⇒ a list of subjects they like (generally students do better in subjects they like)
- ⇒ discussions with their current teachers of English and Maths to determine what options they should take in these areas in year 11
- ⇒ discussions about certificate courses offered by our college
- ⇒ Interviews with the Middle Leader Careers, Transition Support Officer, Middle Leader Diversity or the year 11 and 12 Middle Leader Pastoral Care.

Importantly, each student will have three opportunities to discuss the subject options offered by our college before they begin year 11. It is possible to change subjects during year 11 however this is used as a last resort as it is often difficult for students to “catch up “ on the subject matter they have missed.

Certificate III in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education (TAFE Qld 0275) 10951NAT

This month, three students from Mount St Bernard College were adopted by the Ravenshoe State School in their quest to become Teachers, or at the very minimum, Teacher aides. They are embarking on a two year long, Certificate III in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Education through TAFE North, and supported by RATEP, a program that has been running for over 30 years. Two years ago, four MSB students completed their studies in this subject, and have gone on to work in local schools.

In May, Ranietta Mareko was assigned to a class with Roxy Bafico. Naomi Cross, and her boisterous Year 4s have been keeping Matraima Fuid on her toes, and Jacqui Reyno has welcomed Jacklyn Day into her “very cute” class of year 2 students. The girls supervise breakout reading groups and help the teachers, in class. Their small charges miss them dramatically, when they are not there. Jacklyn was even writing on the board for her teacher, last week, as Ms Reyno had injured her arm.

May and Jacklyn have also contributed to the running of Mount St Bernard College by helping larger junior classes and checking on the behaviour of Juniors within the Responsible Thinking Room (RTR) and Chapel. The skills learnt in this subject are applicable to a number of other professions, providing a variety of competencies, including the building of digital documents and understanding indigenous protocols. RATEP supervisor, Trudy Schieb, has been impressed with our student’s commitment and believes the course has given many of her students more confidence in choosing what they do after school.

This involved collecting water samples at four specific sites along the Barron river, focusing on the sustainability and liveability of the water quality.


The students did a great job in analysing the water samples, being very proactive on the day and excellent ambassadors for the school.

A big thank you to Angela Lunny for her scientific skills in the professional analysis of the water samples and help in facilitating the excursion.

The main findings that the class learnt was that the water quality in the Barron river is of good standard, overall, with limited fertilizer / pesticide run off from the farms and other industries in the surrounding areas. However, there was a higher than normal amount of nitrate and phosphate levels in the water, highlighting the fact that the waterways are not in pristine condition and some harmful chemical run off is finding its way into the Barron river.



Years 7 - 10 Food Technology & Design Report

It has been another fantastic few weeks in the hospitality kitchen where the students are really starting to understand that the art of cooking basic simple recipes is both fun and beneficial. We have some new faces join the cooking team, with the roll over of new classes of Year 7's and 8's. Special thanks to the school officers, Andrea Gower and Michelle Haines, for the wonderful job they do in mentoring and inspiring the students to try their very best at all times, and a big shout out to Chef Serena Gallo, for all her hard work in ordering the stock for the weekly cooking practicals.
